Alcohol Use Disorders Identification Test-Concise (AUDIT-C)

1.	How often do you have a drink containing alcohol?

Description of Instrument:

The Alcohol Use Disorders Identification Test-Concise (AUDIT-C) is a brief alcohol use disorder screening instrument that reliably identifies individuals who are at risk for alcohol use disorder (including alcohol abuse or dependence). The AUDIT-C is a convenient, abbreviated, well-validated, modified version of the 10-question AUDIT instrument published by the WHO in 1998. It has 3 items (each scored from 0-4) querying the frequency and amount of alcohol use; the total score ranges from 0-12 (i.e., the 3 item scores are summed). The AUDIT-C is widely-used and well-validated in a broad range of populations including veterans and patients with chronic pain (Bradley et al., 2003; Rief et al., 2020). The higher the score, the more likely it is that an individual will have alcohol use disorder and be at risk for adverse drinking-related consequences.
